### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors of The Manitoba Ozone Protection Industry Association Inc.

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of THE MANITOBA OZONE PROTECTION INDUSTRY ASSOCIATION INC., which comprise the statement of financial position as at October 31, 2019, and the statement of operations, statement of changes in net assets and statement of cash flows for the year ended October 31, 2019, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### October 31, 2019

#### 1. PURPOSE OF ORGANIZATION

The Manitoba Ozone Protection Industry Association Inc. operates as a not-for-profit organization and accordingly, is exempt from paying income tax under Section 149(1)(1) of the Income Tax Act.

Originally organized as a group independent from Government, the purpose of the association is to propose, evaluate and review regulation in regard to ozone depleting substances.

#### 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies.

#### Revenue Recognition:

All revenue is initially recognized in the year it is received or receivable if the amount can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Industry certification, Memberships and Distributors revenue are earned through the passage of time and require periodic adjustment, see note 4.

#### Amortization:

Amortization of capital assets is provided on an annual basis at the following rates:

30% declining balance

5 years straight line

#### Contributed Services:

Volunteers contribute time to assist the association in carrying out its activities. Due to the difficulty of determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

#### Capital Disclosures:

In managing capital, the association focuses on liquid resources available to fund ongoing operations. The association's objective is to have sufficient liquid resources available to fund current operations as well as future operations. The need for liquid resources is considered in the preparation of an annual budget and in the monitoring of cash flows and actual operating results compared to budget. As at October 31, 2019, the association has met its objective of having sufficient liquid resources to meet its current obligations.

## 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

#### **Financial Instruments:**

It is management's opinion that the association is not exposed to significant credit, currency, interest, liquidity, market or other price risk.

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. The association is exposed to less than significant credit risk.

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in foreign currency rates. The association is not exposed to currency risk as all transactions occur in Canadian currency.

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The association is exposed to less than significant interest rate risk.

Liquidity risk is the risk that the association will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The association has maintained positive working capital that minimizes its exposure to liquidity risk.

Market risk and other price risk are the risks that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market prices. The association is not exposed to market risk as it has a diversified investment portfolio to reduce market fluctuations.

Management believes these risks are manageable and do not represent a threat to the association's ability to continue as a going concern.

## Use of Estimates in the Preparation of Financial Statements:

Preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for notfor-profit organizations require management to make estimates and assumptions about future events that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ significantly from those estimates.

#### Accounts Receivable:

Accounts receivable are net of allowance for doubtful accounts.
